Bible Study Overview

- **Lesson 1** teaches us that little children can care for others.
- In **Lesson 2** we learn that God brings His love to us.
- **Lesson 3** reminds us of the birth of Jesus and His love for us.

To the leaders/teachers . . .

These guides were developed to:

- Introduce the lesson on Sabbath. The child then reviews and applies the principles studied with the help of their parents and Bible study guides during the week. In this way, the lessons learned in Sabbath School become a vital part of the child's growing faith experience. Memory verses, which are also learned in Sabbath School, are reviewed and reinforced during the following week, connected in the child's mind with the interesting activities they have already experienced.
- Focus the entire Sabbath School time on one message. These messages each relate to one of the four dynamics of a growing faith experience: grace (God loves me), worship (I love God), community (we love each other), and service (God loves you, too).
- Reach each child in the way he or she learns best. By following the
 natural learning cycle on which these outlines were based, you will also
 connect students with "the message" for the week in a way that will capture
 each one's attention and imagination.

- Give children active learning experiences so they can more readily
 internalize the truths being presented. These experiences are followed by
 debriefing sessions in which you ask questions that lead the children to reflect on
 what they experienced, interpret the experience, and apply that information to
 their lives.
- **Involve the adult Sabbath School staff** in new and flexible ways. A very small Sabbath School can be managed by one adult. A larger Sabbath School can be managed by one leader/teacher with other adult volunteers to facilitate the small group interaction. This gives small group facilitators a maximum involvement with the students and their learning experience while requiring a minimum of preparation on the facilitator's part.

A creative alternative is to enlist leaders/teachers with different personal learning styles to lead different segments of the program.

(Note: The Getting Started section is the time-honored "business" of Sabbath School and may be used at any point during the lesson; however, it is recommended that you begin with Arrival Activities, even while some children are still arriving.)

To use this guide . . .

Try to follow the natural learning cycle outlined, but adapt activities as necessary to make the program work in your particular situation.

As you follow the natural learning sequence outlined in each lesson, you may want to adapt activities for use in your particular situation, and this may require a change in the need for materials.

Look ahead at the Program Overview for each month's program so you can be prepared with the materials suggested. Before the quarter begins, obtain regularly used supplies.

Basic Needs of Children*

All children have certain basic needs as well as needs that are specific to their age and stage of development.

The basic needs of children are . . .

Physical

- Food
- Warmth
- Shelter

Mental

Power—to make choices and follow plans

Emotional

- A sense of belonging
- Approval and recognition
- Expressions of unconditional love and acceptance

- Freedom within defined boundaries
- Humor—a chance to laugh

Spiritual

- An all-knowing, loving, caring God
- Forgiveness of wrongs and a chance to start over
- Assurance of acceptance with God
- Experience in prayer, answers to prayer
- A chance to grow in grace and in the knowledge of God

Developmental Needs

In addition to the basic needs listed earlier, 2-year-olds need to experience:

- Power—to have a chance to manipulate objects, events, people
- Freedom—to make choices, to interact in learning situations, to sometimes move about at will
- Independence—to do some things unaided
- Security—to feel safe

The Beginner Child

In the Seventh-day Adventist Church the GraceLink curriculum for beginners targets children ages birth through 2 years. However, both the beginner and the kindergarten materials are adaptable to 3-year-olds.

A general rule applying to the beginner child is: seat children so their feet easily touch the ground. For children under 18 months use walkers (without wheels).

To better understand beginner children, ages birth through 2 years, it is helpful to note characteristics of their growth and development.

Physical

- Vary greatly in their physical development
- Are growing rapidly
- Tire easily
- Cannot sit still for long

Mental

- Have an attention span of only one or two minutes
- Learn by active involvement and imitation rather than by instruction
- Learn best one ministep at a time
- Focus attention on what they see and/or touch

Emotional

- Are extremely egocentric—centered in themselves
- Fear separation from parents

- Cry easily; one crying child sets other children crying
- Express their needs by crying.
 The crying usually stops when the child's needs are met.
- Become attached to adults who show love and acceptance of them

Spiritual

- Sense attitudes of respect, joy, and anticipation in connection with church, the Bible, and Jesus
- Can identify pictures of Jesus and lisp His name
- Will fold hands (briefly) for the blessing before meals and kneel (again briefly) for prayer

Getting Ready to Teach

The Bible Lesson at a Glance

Jairus' daughter is very sick. Jairus tries everything to make her better, but it does not help. Jairus seeks Jesus to ask Him to come and heal his daughter. While on the way to Jairus' house, Jesus is delayed. Word comes from Jairus' house that his daughter has died. Jesus tells Jairus to believe. Jesus goes to Jairus' house and raises the little girl back to life.

This is a lesson about service.


Showing love and care to those who

are sick is an act of service. As Christians we can share God's love with others when they need it most. Children can serve God by praying for, visiting, and cheering up people who are sick.

Teacher Enrichment

"God designs that the sick, the unfortunate, those possessed of evil spirits, shall hear His voice through us. Through His human agents He desires to be a comforter, such as the world has never before seen. His words are to be voiced by His

ONE



followers: 'Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me.' The Lord will work through every soul that will give himself up to be worked, not only to preach but to minister to the despairing and to inspire hope in the hearts of the hopeless. We are to act our part in relieving and softening the miseries of this life" (Welfare Ministry, p. 22).

"Jesus set out at once with the ruler [Jairus] for his home. Though the disciples had seen so many of His works of

mercy, they were surprised at His compliance with the entreaty of the haughty rabbi; yet they accompanied their Master, and the people followed, eager and expectant" (*The Desire of Ages*, p. 342).

Room Decorations

Use a dark piece of fabric as a boat, or make the outline of a boat on the floor with tape. Hang a sheet across the corner of the room to be Jairus' house. Place a little mat or bed there.

PARENT TIME

Busy parents often arrive at church tired and worn out from the week's activities and from getting the family ready for the "day of rest." Share a word of encouragement with them sometime during Sabbath School (possibly during Arrival Activities), something that will express your care and concern for them. The following statements were prepared by young mothers and fathers as suggestions, and may be used at your discretion at any time you wish.

Week 1

When my oldest son was small he used to laugh at people when they got

hurt. I think it was his nervous reaction to a situation he didn't know how to handle, but I was appalled! We have worked hard on teaching him to show compassion for someone who is hurt.

My younger son carried around his favorite "snuggly" (blanket) for many years. He would show his concern for a hurt child by sharing his snuggly with them. From a young age both my boys would pat me on the back when I held them, as if to communicate their love even before they could speak. I want to be a good example of compassion to my children so they will learn to care for others as Jesus did.

How are you teaching compassion to your children? How are they communicating it to others?

Week 2

Two a.m. "Mommy! MOMMY!" I woke to a distressed cry. My 18-monthold daughter cried out again, "MOOOMMMMMMYYYY!"

I ran toward the sound as quickly as my foggy brain would let me. Flipping on the light as I entered her room, I saw her standing up in her crib. I dashed over to her just in time to have her vomit the entire contents of her hurting little tummy into my outstretched hands. So there we were. I couldn't pick her up until I went to the bathroom to take care of my handful of yuck. And there she stood, hurting and helpless.

When you have moments of wishing you could be more than one person to help your hurting child, remember, Jesus knows your heart. He says, "Do not fear, for I am with you. . . . I will strengthen you and help you" (Isaiah 41:10, NIV).

Share a time you felt helpless to help your child. What verses from God's words encourage you in those moments?

Week 3

I didn't pay much attention to the one red blisterlike spot on my shoulder, but when I awoke to more spots I knew I was in trouble. Having a full-blown case of chicken pox at age 30 is miserable! The intense itching and pain are awful. I couldn't sleep, and I couldn't care for my 1-year-old for about three days. It took about two weeks before I felt presentable in public.

Then my 1-year-old came down with chicken pox. I was up with him until four one morning because he just couldn't fall asleep with the intense itching. I felt so sorry for him. But I was also thankful that I knew exactly how he felt. I could be more patient and kind in caring for him

because I understood.

Jesus understands the sufferings we are going through. Just as He was so sympathetic to the people He healed, He understands our problems as parents.

Share a time when you were able to empathize with your child. How can you help them learn to be kind and sympathetic toward others?

Week 4

My 2½-year-old woke early and followed his daddy down the stairs to the kitchen. While my husband poured cereal for himself, our son climbed up into his chair at the table and asked for breakfast too. My husband told him that he couldn't make breakfast for him because he was late, but Mommy would be down in a few minutes to get him some. To that our son replied, "You can. You're stronger."

Little ones put their complete trust in their parents. Is there anything Daddy and Mommy can't do? Yes, there are lots of things we can't do on our own for our children. We want to help them, but we often feel inadequate. God can give us wisdom. He can show us how to raise our children to His glory.

Share a time you wanted to help your child but felt inadequate. How did God assist you?

Week 5

My two boys were helping their dad wash the car. The 5-year-old squirted the 2-year-old with the hose. The 2-year-old yelled, "No! Don't water me. I'm not a flower!"

Many times I have witnessed these two hitting each other, grabbing toys away, shoving, calling names, and generally not being nice. Those are discouraging moments. But then there are the times, and they are not that far between, when they give each other a hug, hold hands while walking, play together and

share so nicely, and tell each other that they are best friends. Those are the golden moments! I cherish those times and always try to praise them for their kindness to each other.

If your young children are having

conflicts, take heart. It is normal. But find the positive and praise it.

Tell about a time you have witnessed kindness from your child. What can you do to encourage kindness in your home?



ARRIVAL ACTIVITIES

Plan simple play activities on a blanket, sheet, or quilt for children who arrive early. The children participate in these activities under the supervision of an adult until the program begins. The child's play should be with materials that relate to the program, which is based on the monthly Bible story.

Choose from the following suggested activities for this month. Be sure to include something for the span of children's ages.

A. Book Basket

Provide a basket full of simple picture books about Jesus, children, doctors/ nurses, health, caring for others, etc.

B. Happy/Sad Face

Give each child a "happy/sad face" made from a paper plate (see illustration), or just ask the children to make a happy face and then a sad face. Talk about times that you're happy. Sing "If You're Happy and You Know It" (Little Voices Praise Him, No. 200).

C. Don't Cry

Talk about things that make people sad or make them cry. Talk about how babies cry and when. Take turns holding, rocking, and comforting baby dolls.

D. Sick Room

Invite a doctor or nurse to bring their stethoscope to class and let the children hear their heartbeat. Or invite someone who has a cast, stitches, or who has been in the hospital recently to come to class for show-and-tell (within reason). Have a basket with an assortment of gauze bandages, slings, and adhesive bandages and dolls for the children to practice with.

E. Where Is Your ____? Play "Where is your ____ _?" with the children as they identify and point to their body parts. Count fingers and toes. Count eyes and ears. Count arms, legs, mouth, and nose. Talk about the things you do with each body part. Thank Jesus for all your body parts.

F. God Made You

Talk about how special God made each of us and how He wants us to be healthy and happy. Do the "God Made You, God Made Me" finger play.

G. Healthy Foods

Fill a basket with an assortment of plastic or play foods that are healthy.

Allow the children to play with them as you help them name the foods. Talk about all the good food God made for us that helps us stay healthy.

H. Rocking Chair

Have an adult-size rocking chair available for parents to hold and rock children who are too tired or shy to join in the activities.

Stained-Glass Heart

Then allow the children to place the pieces of colored tissue paper on the sticky heart to make a "stained-glass" window hanging.

Week 5 (or optional activity) **Get-Well Card**

You Need:

Beforehand, copy the heart-shaped card (see p. 72) onto heavy paper. Parents can cut out the heart shape. Allow the children to decorate it with crayons and stickers, if possible. Have the children give or mail their card to a sick person during the week.

Have you ever been really sick? Jesus cares when you are sick. The Bible tells about a time Jesus made a sick girl well.

See Mrs. Jairus. (Point to woman.)
Boohoo! (Pretend to cry.) See Mrs. Jairus. (Point to woman.) She is sad. See
Mr. Jairus. (Point to Jairus.) He is sad
too. They are worried. Their daughter
is very sick.

"Who can help her?" asks Mrs. Jairus. "We must get help or she will die."

"Jesus can help," says Mr. Jairus. "I will ask Jesus to help her."

See Jesus. (*Point to Jesus.*) Everyone wants to be with Jesus. Jesus smiles at the people. He smiles at the children.

(Point to the children.) Jesus sees Mr. Jairus coming through the crowd. (Point to Jairus.) Jesus smiles at him, too.

"Jesus, please come to my house," Mr. Jairus begs. (Point to Jairus.) "Please come and heal my little girl. She is very sick."

Shh! The people stop talking. Shh! The people listen. (*Cup hand to ear.*) Will Jesus go?

A sick woman needs Jesus. (Point to the woman trying to touch Jesus' clothing.) The sick woman touches His coat.

Jesus stops to find out who touched Him. The woman comes and tells Him that she did. Jesus tells her that she has been healed and that she should go in peace.

Poor Jairus! He just waits. And waits. And waits.

"Mr. Jairus, sir, come home," his servant says. (Point to the servant.) "Do

not bother Jesus anymore," the man whispers. (Whisper.) "Your little girl is dead."

(Loudly, urgently.) "Wait!" says Jesus. "Just believe, and she will be all right. I am coming with you. Don't cry. Only believe."

"Don't cry," Jesus says to Mr. Jairus. "Only believe."

Jesus reaches Jairus' house. "Don't cry, Mother! I will help. I will help your daughter."

Shh! (Whisper.) What will Jesus do?



(Speak loudly; take child's hand.) "Little child, get up," Jesus says. (Pull your child to sitting position. Hug him or her.)

Mrs. Jairus smiles. Mr. Jairus smiles too. "Thank You, Jesus!" they say.

Jesus smiles and says, "Give her something to eat."

Jesus cares if we're happy or sad, sick or well. We can help Jesus care for others by being kind and loving.

- **1.** Make extra food for supper and, with your child, share some with a sick neighbor.
- **2.** Write the memory verse on a card and decorate it. Help your child give it to someone who is ill.
- **3.** Have your child blow bubbles for someone who is sad. Have your child give that person a hug.
- **4.** Line up cushions close together and you and your child squeeze through. Talk about Jesus and Jairus squeezing through the crowd on their way to Jairus' house.
- **5.** At bathtime, as hands, feet, mouth, and ears are washed, talk about ways children can use those body parts to help others.
- **6.** Draw a happy face on a piece of cardboard and have your child help you decorate it. Attach a string for hanging. Write "Jesus loves you." on it and send it to a children's hospital or nursing home.
- **7.** In the morning or after naptime, say, "Little girl/boy, get up!" Have them jump up, then tell them the story of Jesus and Jairus' daughter.



Study these suggestions for something to do each day with your child. Select those that are appropriate for your child's developmental stage and repeat them often.

- **8.** Play "hospital" with your child. Take turns being the sick person and the doctor or nurse.
- **9.** Talk about things that help you feel better when you get hurt. How can you help others feel better? Sing "Don't Cry, Little Baby" (*Little Voices Praise Him,* No. 246) when someone is sad or hurt.
- **10.** As you make the bed, sing together, "I'm a little helper."
- **11.** Use your "Little Girl's Bed" craft from Sabbath School to tell the story of Jairus and Jesus.
- **12.** Make cookies with a heart-shaped cookie cut-

ter. Write out the memory verse and attach it. With your child, give them to friends and family.

- **13.** Let your child share a favorite blanket or toy stuffed animal with someone who is sad or hurt.
- **14.** Record your child singing Sabbath School songs and send the recording to a shut-in or faraway grandparents who may be missing their family.
- **15.** Decorate cups or cans of food with paper and fabric to be Jesus, Jairus, a few disciples, and Jairus's daughter. Tell the story of Jesus and Jairus.

Busy parents often arrive at church tired and worn out from the week's activities and from getting the family ready for the "day of rest." Share a word of encouragement with them sometime during Sabbath School (possibly during Arrival Activities), something that will express your care and concern for them. The following statements were prepared by young mothers and fathers as suggestions, and may be used at your discretion at any time you wish.

Week 1

I used to be a decent, respectable human being. I knew how to organize things, accomplish things, finish a project. Then my son was born. Suddenly everything in my life seemed total chaos! My house was a mess, my body was a mess, my life was one big mess. How could it be that at this wonderful time in my life I felt so awful? I began to attend a mother's group that became my lifeline. It met only twice a month, but that was twice a month that I knew I wasn't alone! God used other people who were going through the same things to lift me up and help me remember that He knew me. God knows YOU! He feels every emotion you experience. He says to you, "I will not leave you comfortless. I will come to you" (see John 14:18).

What are some things we can do to strengthen and encourage one another?

Week 2

Amy smiled. I've actually accomplished something this morning! she thought. The floor was mopped, and 22 cups of granola cereal cooled in a bowl on the counter. Going into the bedroom, she shut the door behind her. While the boys napped she could make a couple

of phone calls and fold some laundry.

Unknown to Amy, her 2-year-old was NOT asleep. He went to the kitchen, pulled a chair over to the counter, and proceeded to dump all 22 cups of fresh granola onto the floor. Then he added a big box of dry cereal. He continued the adventure by emptying the full garbage can on the mess. About that time Amy came into the kitchen. . .

Ever had that kind of day? Jesus understands. He calls you to Him. He knows your frustration. And He will pick up the pieces.

Share a time your child undid all the work you had done and the frustrations you felt. In those moments, what can help YOU remember God's love and care for you?

Week 3

One afternoon we took a walk. For some reason, our almost 3-year-old had decided that a walk was NOT what he wanted to do. He asked, "Daddy, will you carry me?" I answered him teasingly, "Oh, son, you're too big for me to carry!" Crossing his little arms firmly across his chest, he answered with determination, "Well, I am NOT too heavy for JESUS!"

Share a time the burdens of parenthood seemed heavy. Turn to someone near you and remind them, "NOTHING is too heavy for JESUS!"

Week 4

Here's a precious thought of encouragement today! Put YOUR name in each of the blanks: "Jesus knows the burden of ______'s heart. He is _____'s best friend in every emergency. His everlasting arms support ______" (Ellen White, Bible Echo, Sept. 1, 1893). (Read this

through more than once, to give everyone the opportunity to let the thought really sink into their hearts.)

Week 5

My friend, a nurse, was used to working the night shift. After her baby's birth she expressed her feelings of exhaustion

and amazement at what a lot of time it took to care for a newborn. "I'm doing OK with the baby being up a lot at night, but I keep wondering when the day shift is coming in!" Remember in times like these that Jesus knows your feelings.

Share a time you felt exhausted and needed a break.



ARRIVAL ACTIVITIES

Plan simple play activities on a blanket, sheet, or quilt for children who arrive early. The children participate in these activities, under the supervision of an adult, until the program begins. The child's play should be with materials that relate to the program, which is based on the monthly Bible story.

Choose from the following suggested activities for this month. Be sure to include something for the span of children's ages.

A. Animals

Provide toy stuffed animals (some that make noises) for the children to hold. If possible, provide adult and baby animals for the children to match. Build a cave for the animals with blocks or with a sheet and two chairs. Let the children put the animals in their "house." Provide green paper for the older children to shred or crunch and then feed to the animals.

B. Peekaboo Box

Place a piece of fabric or a hand towel and play objects such as blocks, rattles, balls, stuffed animals, etc., into a box. Parents can hide an object under the fabric and let children play peekaboo to find something hidden, as the parent says this rhyme:

Peekaboo Let's see who Finds a (name of the object) that got lost (child picks up the object). (Name) did! (Hug the child. Affirm the child.)

C. Nesting Toys

Hide a small object (could be a small toy sheep) inside or under a nesting toys set. (Nesting dolls, different size boxes, or plastic containers all work well.) Children will open the nesting toys until they find the lost sheep or other object.

D. Pets

Bring in a small pet (turtle, bird, fish, hamster, kitten, or puppy) that children can look at, touch, and feed. Ask them to name the animal, make the sound the animal makes, and tell what it eats.

E. Hide-and-Seek

Hide objects or toy animals inside a box, under a chair, or in other places in the room. Ask the children to find them. When they find the animal, say: **How happy we are that we found the lost (name of the animal or object).** Option: Have children hide under a table. Have the other children or parents look for them.

F. Rock-a-bye Baby

Provide a child-size rocking chair and dolls and blankets for the children to hold and rock while singing or listening to music.

G. Rocking Chair

Provide an adult-size rocking chair for parents to hold and rock children who are too tired or shy to join in the activities.

Dress as the shepherd and tell the story, or ask another adult to be the shepherd while you narrate. The children will either hold and use the toy sheep during the entire program or wear their sheep masks and pretend to be sheep. Before you begin the story, ask one adult and a child to be the lost sheep and to hide at the appropriate point in the story.

Say: Once there was a shepherd who had many sheep. Invite the children to bring their toy sheep or wear their sheep masks and come sit on the floor near the

shepherd. The shepherd loved each of his sheep. He knew each of their names. There's Hannah, and Brian,

and Rachel, and Daniel. (Use the names of each of the children in your class.) The shepherd knew what was special about each sheep. (Name characteristics about the children in your class, such as the oldest, youngest, biggest, littlest, hair color, etc. Be sensitive to differences that might be embarrassing.) Each one of the shepherd's sheep was special, and the shepherd loved each one. He loved the big grown-up sheep, and he loved the little baby lambs. Every morning the shepherd counted to make sure all of his sheep and lambs

were there. One, two, three . . . (Count the children. Invite them to count with you.) Yes, they were all there. The shepherd was very happy.



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



Create a headdress for the shepherd by folding one edge of the tissue or fabric over

the front of the craft stick and pulling the rest of it to the back of the stick. Tie it with a piece of string or secure it with a chenille stick. Draw a shepherd's face with the marker. Glue on a pretzel stick for a staff and a cotton ball for a lamb. Attach a magnet to the back if desired.

Bible Activities (optional)

If there is still time, families may choose from a variety of activities that reinforce this month's Bible story. Those activities listed as Arrival Activities may be used again. In addition, you may want to provide a snack at one table.

Spread a little peanut butter or other spread on a round cracker. Create a face with the raisins. Use pretzel sticks for legs. Sprinkle flaked coconut on the peanut butter for sheep's wool. (Children may put the finished "sheep" in a sealable plastic bag and take it home.)

Closing

Say: Jesus loves us and cares for us just as a shepherd cares for his sheep. Jesus even calls Himself our Shepherd. Close with a short prayer similar to the following: Dear Jesus, thank You for loving us and caring for us just as a shepherd cares for his sheep. We love You, Jesus. Amen.

As the children prepare to leave the room, sing "Good-bye Prayer" (Little Voices Praise Him, No. 44).

The Message

Jesus cares for you and me.

The Good Shepherd

Baa! says the woolly lamb. Woolly Lamb wants his mother. Baa-baa! Don't worry, little lamb. The shepherd will help you.

Wake up, shepherd! It's time to get up. (Point to the shepherd, then the sheep.)

Wake up, sheep! It's time to nibble the thick, green grass.

Wake up, Woolly Lamb! (Point to the black lamb.) It's time for breakfast. Baa-baa!

Don't move, fluffy sheep. Don't move, Woolly Lamb. It's time for the shepherd to count the sheep.

(Touch child's nose for each count.) 1-2-3-4-5. The shepherd is counting the sheep. 21-22-23-24.

Are all the sheep safe? 97-98-99-100! Yea! (Clap hands.)

All the sheep are counted. All the sheep are safe.

The sun is high in the sky. The sun feels hot. The sheep feel thirsty. Woolly Lamb stays close to mother sheep. Sniff-sniff! (Pretend to sniff.) The sheep smell water.

Let's run to the water. (Run to the sink; drink water.)

Walking, walking. The sheep are tired of walking. "Let's stay here for a while," the shepherd says. But big, ugly flies buzz about the sheep. (Point to the flies.) Buzz-buzz! (Tickle your child.)

Flies buzz Woolly Lamb's eyes. Flies buzz Woolly Lamb's nose. Woolly Lamb stamps his feet. (*Stamp feet.*) All the sheep stamp at the flies.

Don't move, fluffy sheep, don't move! The shepherd gives medicine to each sheep. (Touch child's face.) The shepherd gives medicine and counts (touch child's nose and count) 97-98-99.

Uh-oh! Woolly Lamb is not here. Where is Woolly Lamb?

"Woolly Lamb, where are you?" (Child hides face with tissue.)

Is Woolly Lamb in the pool? (*Point.*) No, he is not there. (*Shake head.*) Is he near the rocks? (*Point.*) No, not there.



Where is Woolly Lamb? Shh! Listen. (Your child says, "Baa!")

Oh, there you are! (Remove tissue; hug child.)

Baa-baa! Woolly Lamb is safe. Thank you, shepherd, for finding him. Thank you, shepherd, for bringing him back.

Thank You, Jesus, for loving our own little lamb. (Hug child. Spin with child around the room.)

- **1.** You and your child play making different animal sounds. Thank God for animals.
- **2.** Make up a little song about the shepherd and the sheep or, with your child, sing one that you learned in Sabbath School.
- **3.** Look for things with different textures. With your child, touch them and talk about how different things feel. Look for a texture that feels like sheep's wool.
- **4.** Play hide-and-seek with your child. Hug him/her when you find him/her. Then sing the memory verse song.
- **5.** Put in a drawer or in a box things related to the lesson (cotton or toy sheep, some food, water in a plastic bottle). Use them to tell the Bible story to your child.
- **6.** Put some food for birds on a bird feeder, or let your child help you feed some animals at the park.
- **7.** Tell the lost sheep story while playing "Follow the Leader." Crawl under the table, climb "mountains" (pillows), and so on.
- **8.** Make a trail with paper streamers. Have your child find his/her way to the "lost



Study these suggestions for something to do each day with your child. Select those that are appropriate for your child's developmental stage and repeat them often.

- sheep" by following the streamers. Sing "The Good Shepherd" (learned in Sabbath School).
- **9.** With your child, make an edible sheepfold and sheep. Make the sheepfold with bread, cookies, or fruit pieces. Make sheep out of banana pieces or some other fruit covered with coconut.
- **10.** Sing a song or make one up about mother sheep and other animals taking care of their babies.
- **11.** Along with your child, using blocks, build a sheepfold.
- **12.** Hide a toy stuffed animal. You and your child can look for it and sing the memory verse

song when you find it.

- **13.** Show your child how to model some sheep with play dough or make cookies with the shape of sheep or a shepherd's staff.
- **14.** Have your child say thank You to Jesus for giving them a mommy and/or daddy to take care of them.
- **15.** Play a call-and-respond game. Parent calls: "Little lamb, little lamb, where are you?" Child answers with animal sound. (Repeat with other animals.)

Getting Ready to Teach

The Bible Lesson at a Glance

Joseph and Mary travel to Bethlehem to be counted as ordered by Caesar Augustus, the Roman emperor. But they can't find any place to stay because the city is full of people who have come for the same reason. An innkeeper lets them stay in his stable. Jesus is born there, and Mary wraps Him in swaddling cloths and lays Him in a manger. Angels show the shepherds where Jesus was born. The shepherds come and worship Jesus. The Wise Men follow a

star to find Jesus. They worship Him and give Him valuable gifts.

This is a lesson about worship.

Worship is our response to God as we recognize Him as the source of all. It is not possible to fully comprehend what it meant for Jesus, the God of the universe and our all-powerful Creator, to leave heaven and come to this earth as a newborn child. When we meditate on this radical act of love and accept His love for us, we can't help worshipping Him.

Teacher Enrichment

"The King of glory stooped low to take humanity. Rude and forbidding were His earthly surroundings. His glory was veiled, that the majesty of His outward form might not become an object of attraction. He shunned all outward display. . . . Only the beauty of heavenly truth must draw those who would follow Him" (*The Desire of Ages*, p. 43).

Those celebrating the birth* of Jesus were but a few men who traveled from afar to worship Him. "'When they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary His mother, and fell down, and worshiped him.' Beneath the lowly guise of Jesus, they recognized the presence of Divinity. They gave their

hearts to Him as their Saviour, and then poured out their gifts—'gold, and frank-incense, and myrrh'" (*The Desire of Ages*, p. 63).

Room Decorations

Divide the room into an indoor and outdoor scene. For the indoor scene, set up a nonbreakable Nativity set with a large star above it. Attach white lights to a sheet and drape it across the ceiling like stars or hang it on the wall with a "window frame" of wood or paper around it (to see the stars through the window). For the outdoor scene, hang on the wall green or brown paper with drawings of hills. Cover boxes with burlap and add a few trees.

* Note to teachers: The word birth here means that the Wise men were celebrating the fact that Jesus was born, not that they were present at His birth. Notice that the text below says that they came into the house, not the stable. It is believed that lesus was at least 6 weeks old or older. See SDA Bible Commentary p. 288

PARENT TIME

Busy parents often arrive at church tired and worn out from the week's activities and from getting the family ready for the "day of rest." Share a word of encouragement with them sometime during Sabbath School (possibly during Arrival Activities), something that will express your care and concern for them. The following statements were prepared

by young mothers and fathers as suggestions, and may be used at your discretion at any time you wish.

Week 1

Outside at the park one day we were playing with rocks: tiny ones, big ones, smooth ones, and rough ones. "Mommy," said my sweet little girl,

"Jesus is my favorite rock!" That's right, my darling. Keep Jesus as your favorite rock. "The Lord is my rock, my place of safety, my Savior" (2 Samuel 22:2, ICB).

How can we teach our children to cling to Jesus? Is Jesus your favorite rock?

Week 2

Our baby was dying. He was born with a rare heart defect, and at that time there was no procedure to correct it. As the days passed and he became weaker, I would just hold him and look at his perfect little fingers and toes, and wonder *Why?* He lived for several months, and I began to look at each day as a gift. His short little life was truly a gift. Before he died, I became pregnant with our second child. I also began to see that my kind Father was giving me another gift. Those months with my baby, though bittersweet, were precious.

Children are a gift from the Father's heart. You may face heartaches and trials with them, but they are a loving gift. "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming from the Father" (James 1:17, NIV).

Week 3

I had told our 18-month-old countless times not to pull the blooms off my flowers. Now he was out on the deck, and his brother was yelling at me: "He's doing it again!" In came my little boy with a plucked marigold in his tiny hands. He thrust it at me and said, "Mommy!" How could I get upset at the preciousness and sincerity of his gift? I took the flower from him and kissed his chubby cheek.

How much more was God's gift to us, His Son. Jesus was a helpless, crying, wetting baby. But what a priceless gift He was! Can you think of a time your child's gift to you was from their heart?

Week 4

Every year I had longed to dash out and buy a "Baby's First Christmas" ornament. But year after year I was childless. I was teaching school, and one day after dismissal I went to the church to get ready for my students' Christmas program. As I walked into the sanctuary, I was impressed with the presence of God. "You are here," I whispered as I knelt there in worship. I knew I was in His care in a special way.

It was still three years before I was able to hang that "Baby's First Christmas" ornament on my tree, but when I held my young son on the eve of his first Christmas, the same feeling of God's presence surrounded me, and all I could do was whisper, "Thank You."

Share a time you just wanted to say to God, "Thank You."

Week 5

The stomach flu had hit with a vengeance. When I wasn't in the bathroom, I was huddled in a ball on the couch. My 3-year-old daughter, seeing my obvious distress, knew exactly what I needed. I opened my eyes when I felt something soft thrust into my hand. It was Pinky, her most beloved stuffed animal. "He'll make you feel better, Mommy," she whispered as she tucked him in.

It was the best gift she could give me. In the same way, our heavenly Father gave the best gift He could to rescue us from our distress—the gift of His Son.

Share a time you have been overwhelmed by an awesome gift from our Father.



ARRIVAL ACTIVITIES

Plan simple play activities on a blanket, sheet, or quilt for children who arrive early. The children participate in these activities, under the supervision of an adult, until the program begins. The child's play should be with materials that relate to the program, which is based on the monthly Bible story.

Choose from the following suggested activities for this month. Be sure to include something for the span of children's ages:

A. Good Bed/Bad Bed

Supply items of different textures and talk about Baby Jesus' bed. Suggestions: cotton balls, extra-fine sandpaper, pine cones, shredded tissue paper, clean straw, soft flannel.

B. How Many?

Put a few toy animals, stars, or doll babies on the floor or a table. Count them with the children.

C. Farm Animal Sounds

Show the children toy stuffed farm

Bring in several small flashlights the children can hold and turn on and off. Create a star effect by cutting a piece of black construction paper a little bigger than the lens of the flashlight. Punch a few tiny holes in the paper and tape it securely to the flashlight lens.

F. Rocking Chair

Provide an adult-size rocking chair for parents to hold and rock children who are too tired or shy to join in the activities.


Snack Center (optional) *Mangers*

Baby Jesus Is Born

See the mother with her new baby. New babies are so special.

See Joseph and Mary. They have traveled a long way. They want to rest.

"I'm sorry," says the man (point to the innkeeper), "all my rooms are full."

"But we have come a long way," Joseph says. (Point to Joseph, then Mary.) "And my wife will soon have a baby."

"Well, you could stay in the barn," answers the kind man. "I have some animals there, but it's warm and dry."

See the animals. (Point to and name the animals.)

See the manger. (Point to the manger.) The hay in the manger is soft. It will make a nice bed for a baby.

The barn will be a good place to stay for a while.

After a while, Baby Jesus was born. "Let's put our baby on the soft hay in the manger," says Joseph. "You should rest a while." (Point to Joseph, then to Mary.)

Mother Mary looks at her new baby boy. She touches His curly, dark hair and His tiny ears. (Touch your child's hair and an ear.) She loves him so much!

"Come," says Joseph. "Come and rest now."

Some shepherds watch their sheep on a nearby hillside. (Point to shepherds, then sheep.) They have heard that Jesus will come to earth. When will He come? they wonder. Will He come soon? God's Word says He will.

The shepherds see a bright, shining star. (*Point to the star.*)

Where did that star come from? they wonder.

Suddenly, an angel appears.

"Do not be afraid," says the angel. (Point to the angel.) "I bring you good news. Jesus the Saviour has been born. You will find Him in the city. Look for a baby lying in a manger."

Many more angels come. So many angels! (Point to the angels.)

The angels sing a beautiful song. Their song fills the air.

Glory to God in the highest.
And on earth peace to everyone.
"We must go," the shepherds
say to one another. "We must go
to the city and look for this baby."

"Thank You, God," the shepherds pray. "Thank You for sending Your Son to this earth. Thank You for sending Jesus to be our Saviour. We will tell everyone we meet about Him."

We can thank God too. (Pray a simple prayer, such as the following.) Thank You, God, for sending Jesus to love us, to save us, and to care for us. We love Him, and we love You, too.



- 1. Roll both ends of a piece of paper together to look like a scroll. Decorate it and write "Follow the star. A Saviour has been born." Talk to your child about the shepherds.
- 2. Make paper or elastic headbands for the family. Attach paper or felt animal ears—cow, donkey, sheep, etc. Sing "Away in a Manger."
- **3.** Allow your child to ride on a rocking horse. Talk to him/her about Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- **4.** Arrange stuffed toy animals in a corner. Count them and talk to your child about Jesus' birth.
- **5.** Provide a "donkey ride" for your older toddler. Talk to him or her about Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- **6.** Shine a flashlight on the ceiling of a darkened room. Show your child how to follow the "star" to find Baby Jesus.
- **7.** Wrap a baby doll in strips of cloth. Sing a song about Baby Jesus. Thank God for lesus.




for something to do each day with your child. Select those that are appropriate for your child's developmental stage and repeat them often.

- **10.** Roll out cookie dough and use a star-shaped cookie cutter. Have your child help you decorate with yellow icing and sprinkles.
- **11.** Visit a Nativity scene and look at the straw. Have your child touch it if possible.
- **12.** Make a cardboard crown and decorate it. Write "Jesus Is King" on the front.
- **13.** Stuff a white sock with cloth scraps and glue cotton balls to it. Draw a sheep's face and ears. Talk to your child about the shepherds who worshipped Jesus.
- **14.** Use blocks or pillows to make a stable. Place toy animals inside it. Sing "Away in a Manger."
- **15.** Have a party for Jesus. Sing songs of praise to Him. Talk about a gift your child might give to Jesus.


